The baton has been passed. This year we added new names to the presiding slate. We welcome their enthusiasm and history of community involvement as follows:

Nancy R. Peck, President, previously served on the Barrington Preservation Society's (BPS) Program and Education Committees. Her experience includes volunteering in the historic preservation arena, writing a local history newspaper column in NJ, and working in multiple small museums. She was a co-founder of the Glen Rock (NJ) Historical Society and a newsletter editor for Glen Rock's Centennial celebration. In addition to her local work with BPS, she is a supporter of the Barrington Garden Club and Blithewold Mansion, Gardens and Arboretum.

Kent M. Phillips, First Vice President, has been a resident of Barrington for 17 years. Kent and his wife Sally raised two boys here. Since retirement from Textron Investment Management as a Senior Vice President, Kent has volunteered with Blithewold Mansion, Gardens and Arboretum, Tap-In, and St. John's Church, and has served on many corporate boards of directors.

Christina M. Scola, Second Vice President, grew up in Barrington. After completing law school, she settled

back in Barrington and currently works for Bank of America in the Estate Settlement department. She was introduced to the Preservation Society by her aunt and uncle who have been very active in the Society.

Two More Houses To Receive Plaques

On Monday, May 19, plaques will be presented to the owners of two charming Victorian houses that are 100 years old and meet the Preservation Society's criteria. Honored will be the **MARTIN-WYMAN HOUSE** (ca. 1883-1928) at 37 Ferry Lane. This large, 2-story Victorian home has a one-story, Colonial Revival gabled wing on the east side. This house is on the "Barn Lot" sold by the estate of Ambrose Martin to Martha Smith in 1865. The Martin family ran the ferry to Warren in the 1770s and owned a large tract bound by Ferry Road and Shore Road (now Mathewson Road). In 1883, Charles H. Martin bought the property and his house appears on the 1895 Map of Barrington. Dwight M. Wyman bought this house in 1928, enlarged it and hence the value jumped from \$1500 to \$3000.

Also awarded a plaque will be the **GEORGE H. MCGREGOR COTTAGE** (1908) at 43 Sowams Road. George H. McGregor of Fall River bought Lot #2 on the 1907 "Warren or Palmer River Plat... belonging to Eliza J. Stanley" to build a summer house. Eliza's plat of 12 lots extended to the Palmer River.

Jennys Lane Historic District Listed on the National Register of Historic Places

Jennys Lane Historic District is a linear district with 30 houses which also includes several properties on Mathewson Road and Rumstick Road, and a boat house on the river. These residences primarily date from the 1850s through the 1920s. Architectural styles include Greek Revival, Queen Anne, Colonial Revival and Craftsman, as well as more vernacular forms.

Development as a summer colony was initiated by Allen C. Mathewson, a Barrington native. A highly successful jeweler, he retired to Barrington in 1862 to build a model farm on Shore Road, now Mathewson Road. Mathewson urged his friends to come and enjoy Barrington’s “fresh air and saltwater” and built two hotels and several Victorian cottages; seven properties are extant that document this Mathewson legacy.

The Barrington Preservation Society spent four years canvassing the neighborhood, soliciting

rehabilitation and may apply for low interest loans for needed restoration work.

Jennys Lane Historic District is Barrington's second neighborhood to achieve this honor. The Alfred Drown Road District achieved the status in 2005.

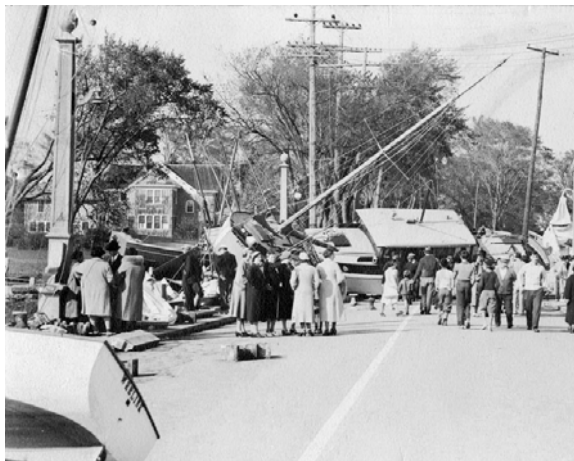

with a small balustrade front porch is almost unchanged today. All the window and door frames in the interior exhibit a unique molded design. This cottage has had only three owners, passing to the Covell family in 1946, then to Mark Allard and Leah O'Mahoney in 1983.

Following the plaque presentation, Joanna Doherty, Preservation Consultant, will give an illustrated talk entitled "The National Register Comes to Jennys Lane." Joanna will explain the benefits of National Register listing and how to apply for the Historic Homeowner Tax Credit. This important state tax incentive is still in place and a welcome benefit to homeowners!

Museum Mission Accomplishments

The BPS Museum has never been more active. Along with school and scout tours comes a steady stream of researchers. Store architects, bridge designers and railroad buffs are among those who've paid a visit.

Also we've seen how the Museum collection is equally valuable to local civic organizations. This year the Yacht Club and St. John's Episcopal Church celebrate major anniversaries. Photos and other articles in our collection have helped them tell their stories. The Rhode Island Country Club, too, has sought help as

they re-create their history in book form. RICC suffered memorabilia losses in a major fire more than 50 years ago and our collection helps fill some gaps. BPS is also the historical repository of past noteworthy groups such as the Barrington Boys' Choir, League of Women Voters and the Barrington Players.

The Museum's mission statement, finalized in 1984, states its intent to act as a center for research, serve in an educational capacity, and be available to citizens and researchers.
